Launch has partnered with Tilth Alliance (formerly Seattle Tilth) for years on everything from connecting our families with their local food supply system to sharing nutrition information and hosting Community Kitchen Events. They continue to help us tend and winterize our school gardens, train our cooks and leadership team members, and provide vouchers for produce shipped straight from the farm.

This year, we're taking part in Tilth Alliance's Good Food Bag program.

This program provides free organic, locally grown, fresh produce to all Seattle Preschool Sites including our five preschool programs at Rainier Community Center, Beacon Hill, Madrona, Leschi, and Highland Park. At no cost to families, Tilth Alliance provides weekly food bags with organic fruits and vegetables, recipes to try using ingredients

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A Note from the Executive Director

As my son approaches his first birthday, I've been thinking about how lucky my family is to have all of the support that we do. There are so many children in our community who lack access to the

support they need to grow into healthy and happy adults.

Quality out-ofschool time, early learning and summer programming is a big support for families and makes a lifelong difference for children, but unfortunately the importance of these programs has recently been under scrutiny. Significant federal cuts to afterschool programming have been proposed, and impact of afterschool programs on children and families is being questioned.

21st Century Community Learning Centers are the most at risk, and while Launch is not a CLC and our funding isn't currently at risk, we believe it's important to speak up and support out-of-school time programs. Schools can't do it alone and the support that community organizations provide is invaluable and helps change outcomes for kids. It's critically important that we get involved in our communities

> and let our lawmakers know what really matters for our kids.

in the bag, plus kitchen tips. These bags are provided weekly to about 120 of our preschool families.

This program helps to Launch to fulfill our goal of serving the whole child. According to Northwest Hunger, one in five children in Washington state live in a food insecure household, and half of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) clients are children.

Thanks to this partnership with Tilth Alliance, our families can support their local community, eat nutritionally

wholesome meals, and support environmentally conscious growing practices. Thank you Tilth Alliance!

What's Happening at Launch

2nd graders at **Maple** wrote and performed a play with a cultural exploration theme for students and their families. The play

was about a dragon who visited other countries, ate new food, and made new friends from different cultures. The students even made costumes and props, including a dragon made out of recycled boxes!

During Spring Break, **Kimball** welcomed Nicole Appell, a teaching artist at MoPOP. Students created wearable fantasy hats, which helped develop fine motor skills, design, engineering and geometry. All their hard work paid off when they went to MoPOP to see their creations displayed in the Sky Church! After exploring the exhibits, the students decided their next big project is a Rube Goldberg-inspired machine.

To get to know their neighborhood better, **Hawthorne** students had a scavenger hunt that took children throughout Columbia City. They had to work together to solve clues, practice their photography skills, and explore their surroundings to earn their final prize.

Beacon Hill had a Game Week during Spring Break, which gave our students a chance to express their creativity and practice skills like problem solving and created and played their own board games, used chalk to create a giant game of darts on the blacktop outside, and explored Jefferson Park while doing a scavenger hunt.

Montlake wrapped up another quarter of Launch clubs, including Dance Team, which concluded in a performance for Parent Night. Gym Games Club taught children new games as well as sportsmanship skills. At Globetrotters Club, students learned about a new country each week including Greece, Romania, Japan, and Thailand. The Student Leadership Club designed projects to make people smile by making Get-Well

cards for children in the hospital, designing place mats for Meals on Wheels, and writing letters to wounded soldiers.

Highland Park celebrated Star Wars Day (May the 4th be with you!) by building scenes with Legos and watching a Lego Star Wars movie. They invited their families to come, relax with students and teachers in Star Wars pajamas, enjoy snacks, pizza, and win a Star Wars gift bag.

The annual Peeps competition happened this April at **Sanislo** and students created 3D scenes for Peeps to inhabit. The People's Choice Award went to a haunted house themed set built by two first graders, and the first place winner, chosen by our Executive Director, was a ballet studio for Peeps of all shapes and colors.
